What happens at the receiving hospital?

When we arrive at the receiving hospital we will explain to the medical and nursing staff what has occurred with your child before and during the transfer. We will then move your child to their cot or hed

If you are not present at this time, the transport team will ring you to let you know they have arrived safely and give you an update on your child's condition.

The staff at the receiving hospital will discuss the different facilities available to you within their organisation, and they will discuss policies such as: visiting policies, staying with your child and giving out of information over the phone.

The transport of your child

is an extremely anxious and stressful time. The need for your child to travel to another hospital for specialist care is necessary to give the best care possible.

You may feel scared and feel a loss of control. These feelings are natural and not uncommon. We aim to provide care and support for you and are happy to answer any questions you may have.

Who are we?

IPATS is a team of highly skilled staff with a background in Intensive Care Medicine or Anaesthesiology who will safely care for your child during their transfer.

This may be a combination of a doctor and transport nurse. Occasionally we bring additional staff who are receiving further training in transport. When we arrive we will introduce ourselves to your child, yourself and the staff caring for your child. Following a full handover from the staff, we will concentrate on assessing, stabilising and preparing your child for transfer. At this stage we may be busy but we will aim to keep you informed.

Specialised Equipment

The equipment being used will depend on your child's age, size, and condition. The staff transporting your child will be happy to inform you on what is being used. This may include monitoring equipment, infusion pumps and a breathing machine. The ambulance your child will be travelling in is specially designed to ensure that all necessary facilities for specialist care are provided whilst on the move.

Getting ready for transfer

The whole process may take some time, please do not be alarmed if this is the case. It is important your child is safe for transfer. Once ready please do not be afraid to touch or kiss your child. A favourite toy or blanket can accompany them if you wish. We will ask you for your contact details and give you the contact details and directions of the receiving hospital.

Am I allowed to travel with my child?

It is usually <u>not</u> possible due to space or safety issues to travel with your child in the ambulance. This will be assessed by the transport team and the team's decision will be based on ensuring your child's safety first and foremost

If you do not have access to private transport, the referring hospital staff will discuss arrangements with you.

If you travel independently, please:

- Do not follow the IPATS Critical Care ambulance as the ambulance may use lights and sirens to facilitate the journey through heavy traffic.
- Please make sure you travel at a safe and steady speed.
- It is not uncommon for the team to stop the ambulance for safety reasons if your child needs attention en route. Please do not be alarmed or stop behind the ambulance. If there is a problem, a member of the team will contact you with an update.
- It is generally advised that you take some time to make arrangements for other children or to pick up any belongings you may need before starting your journey to Dublin.

If you do accompany your child, please:

- Remain seated and wear your seatbelt at all times during the journey.
- Do not undo your seatbelt during the journey, unless instructed by the team.
- The team will try to keep you updated on your child's condition throughout the journey, but our main priority is caring for your child.
- The team may have frequent discussions by telephone in the ambulance to update the accepting PICU of your child's condition.
